The Global Geopark designation, one of only eight in the UK, recognises and celebrates the outstanding geological heritage of the Black Country, spanning 428 million years, through a series of individual Geosites. These include landscapes and viewpoints, disused mines and quarries, canals, national and local nature reserves, museums with spectacular collections, open air visitor attractions and many historic buildings. The Geopark connects the geology under our feet with our cultural and industrial heritage.
